Course Description

An introduction to research methods applied to social science issues and problems. Emphasis is on the nature of the research process, how to conduct research, and how to interpret and disseminate research results.

Prerequisites or Corequisites

ST 201, 351, 351H, or equivalent (basic statistics course) A minimum grade of D- is required in ST 201, ST 351 and ST 351H.

- 6. Write survey questions, construct questionnaires, and conduct survey research.
- 7. Write interview questions, construct interview guides, and conduct qualitative research.
- 8. Interpret and critique research articles, publications, and reports.
- 9. Critically evaluate the uses and limitations of research.

Evaluation of Student Performance

The learning outcomes will be measured through a series of assignments (both individual and group assignments), discussions, quizzes, a midterm exam, and a final group project. Your grade for the course will be based on the following:
